Thursday Evening Gatherings continue on March 4 via Zoom : Green Burial: Carrying our living environmental values into end-of-life choices with Ray Mattolie & Louisa Horne.

Green burial is a growing global movement and interest in this environmentally sensitive approach to disposition of one's body in a way that has a useful purpose is rapidly increasing.

Although Green Burial can be a choice made for interment in any burial ground, there is an increasing demand for dedicated areas to be created in existing cemeteries, or for cemeteries exclusively for green burial. The ultimate choice is for green burial to be in a designated conservation site. There is only one such site in Canada, off the coast of BC, whilst 10 have been established in the USA and many more in the UK.

This session will provide an overview of the principles of green burial, and consider the opportunities it offers to support wider conservation endeavours. This will include an outline of a plan being developed by a parish in the Diocese to develop a conservation area, with green burial as one of the opportunities it offers.

Louisa Horne and Ray Mattholie are passionate supporters of green burial, and members of Green Burial Nova Scotia, a project of the Ecology Action Centre.

DEN Lenten Book Study of Papal Encyclical *Laudato Si’*

The Anglican Diocese of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island sponsors a weekly study of the Papal Encyclical *Laudato Si’* Wednesday mornings at 10 am throughout Lent by Zoom. The Encyclical represents a moral breakthrough in the literature of Climate Crises. Pope Francis joins the plight of the world’s poor with the destruction of the world’s larger environment. The result is the presentation of a dire moment in the history of Humanity – we are urgently called to repair our only common home and bring dignity to the homeless and voiceless.

Up-to-the-minute science is matched with moral lessons of the world's teachers. One of the most powerful messages in the duty passed on to all serious people – Hear the cry of the poor; hear the cry of the Earth. Do Petitions Work? Do petitions work? Sometimes they do. Yesterday our Advocacy editor, Eva Evans, had an email from 350.org saying that their campaign to keep oil company executives and lobbyists off the Net Zero Advisory Panel worked! “Environment Minister Jonathan Wilkinson released the names of that panel and I’m happy to report that there are no members from Shell, Suncor or any of the other Big Oil companies that have undermined climate action for decades.¹We did this. Together. After thousands of people signed the petition calling on federal leaders to be brave and strengthen Bill C-12, the topic was debated in the House of Commons. Of course, we still have a lot of work to do. The fossil fuel industry will continue doing what it can to slow down and weaken climate action. But, today we did something that felt impossible for a long time in Canadian politics, we kept Big Oil out of the room.”

Coal Mining in Australia & the Great Barrier Reef There's a huge disastrous coal mine being built in Australia. To finish it, it needs a key piece of train signalling technology that only German engineering giant Siemens is willing to provide. Siemens said it can't get out of its contract unless it's proven that the coal mine is breaching environmental conditions. Now the proof that they are doing that is there. If not stopped, the Adani Carmichael mine could be exporting massive shiploads of dirty coal through the Great Barrier Reef in as little as six months.
