White Ribbon Sunday 21ST NOVEMBER 2021

Honour White Ribbon Sunday - wear a white ribbon on the Sunday before (or on) November 25 and for the 16 Days of Activism (Nov. 25 – Dec. 10), with the pledge never to commit, condone or remain silent about all forms of gender based violence and discrimination.

White Ribbon Sunday was initiated by the Anglican Church Women Board, Diocese of NS & PEI. The board chose Christ the King Sunday as White Ribbon Sunday to coincide with the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence. Christ the King Sunday is the last Sunday of the Liturgical Calendar year and the Sunday before the First Sunday of Advent.

Refreshed Anglican Church Women Logo



The Anglican Church Women Board members are very pleased that Board Co-coordinator, with responsibility for Publicity, Connie English, has designed a refreshed logo for Anglican Church Women in the Diocese of Nova Scotia & Prince Edward Island. We are delighted that it retains the original logo designed by June Whitman (of St. Paul's Church, Parish of Rosette, Round Hill, Nova Scotia), symbolic of the Board's Purpose, while adding the Diocesan crest and the full title of our Diocese. The best of our research indicates that the original logo was designed and approved in 1971 when our Diocese was called the Diocese of Nova Scotia.

The Anglican Church Women LOGO, is symbolic of our Purpose: To encourage and support all women . . . is symbolized by the three gold rings intertwined; awakening a greater desire for God's mission and Christian service . . . is symbolized by the lighted candle; in the parish, diocese, community, nation, and world. . . is symbolized by a red circle enclosing the candle and rings. The symbols and colours are significant: Red is for charity; Gold is for the richness of God's blessing; and White is for joy.

Connie's addition of the Diocesan crest and title is a great update to a well-loved and very recognizable logo. My research strongly suggests that this year is the 50th anniversary of the approval of the original Anglican Church women logo by June Whitman. Thank you, Connie, for recognizing this milestone anniversary year with your update that embraces all Anglican women in the Diocese of NS & PEI!
